Pre – Primary Wing

WE HAVE FUN WHILE WE LEARN...

Development of cognitive skills is very important in the early years of childhood. It helps build problem solving skills, strengthens decision making processes and critical thinking abilities. Moreover, art activities and real life experiences add to the improvement of attention span, memory and concentration. These also help in strengthening the Shreeyan's fine motor skills. Sharing glimpses of a few activities and crafts related to cognitive concepts done by Shreeyans of Pre-Primary Wing. Pre-Nursery learnt about the Pre-number Concept long and short with real life objects like ribbons and scarfs. As an extension activity they made long and short snakes with play dough.

Nursery had an extension art activity connected with the story 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar', integrated with Theme (Food) and Numbers. It involved recognition, formation and quantity association of number 5. Techniques like sponge dabbling, fork painting, bottle-cap printing etc. were used.

Kindergarten Shreeyans learned about big and small numbers with an interesting story about Ally the alligator who loved to eat big numbers. This was followed by an art & craft activity, where they made an alligator mouth with simple shapes. The Shreeyans had fun making Ally eat all the big numbers.



RAKSHABANDHAN

Rakshabandhan is a festival that typically represents a sister's promise to pray for her brother and the brother's vow to protect and take care of his sister. Sisters tie a Rakhi thread that represents the strong bond of their love. The brother and sister will often exchange gifts as well as sweets. To celebrate this occasion the Shreeyans of Pre-Primary made wonderful crafts which they carried back home. The Shreeyans of Pre-Nursery made a Rakhi by pasting different shapes - triangles and circle, and a ribbon on a colourful sheet. The Shreeyans of Nursery on the other hand made a simple Rakshabandhan card. A Rakhi was made using different sizes of circles and a paper strip pasted on the card with colourful borders. The Shreeyans of Kindergarten enjoyed making a colourful Rakhi with paper strips which they pasted on a ribbon. The Shreeyans enhanced their fine motor skills while making the craft and also learnt about the various shapes and colours.

ART MELA @ GYANSHREE SCHOOL

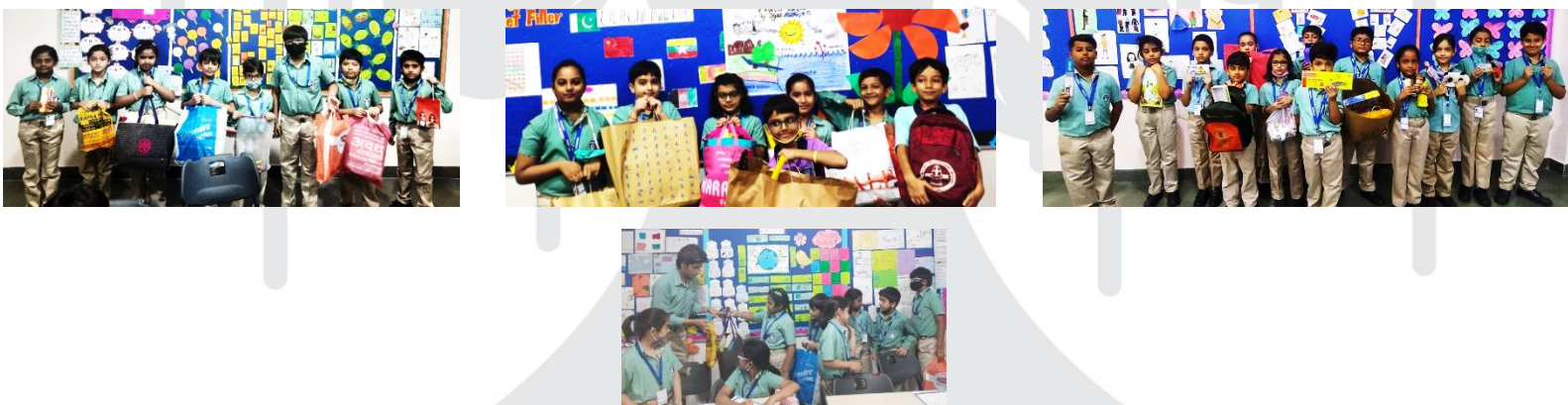

BOOK RECOMMENDATION **THE ALCHEMIST**

“When you want something, the whole universe conspires in order for you to achieve it”

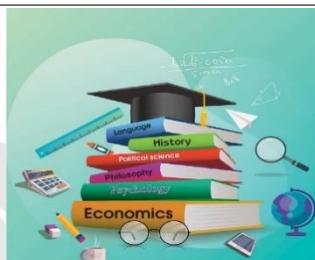
The Alchemist is a fascinating novel by Paulo Coelho which revolves around a shepherd who embarks on a journey to find treasure in the Pyramids of Egypt, after an encounter with an alchemist. The alchemist invokes a hidden desire within the boy, which pushes him to get out of his comfort zone and battle adventure, uncertainty and distress to follow his destiny.

One basic idea that Coelho propagates through this book is that each one of us is aware of what we truly want from our lives. The pressures and burdens of our world force us to ignore and hide that deep desire to take over our own life and follow our own passion. The alchemist in this fable forces the boy to come to the realization that without bidding farewell to his fears and apprehensions and devoting himself completely to fulfilling his dreams, he could never really be happy. The book gives insight into the power of manifestation. By manifesting our dream, by ingraining this thought in our brain, our actions and behaviour start to align with our passion. As Paulo Coelho says, “You are what you believe yourself to be”. Through this novel, Coelho tries to introduce readers to the art of listening to one’s heart, of following one’s instincts and the beauty of leading a fulfilled and complete life doing what one loves.

What I found most fascinating about this book is that there is no definite explanation for all the different lessons Coelho tries to inculcate in the readers. It is a fable with such complex and abstract ideas that everyone who reads it seems to have a different interpretation of it. These ideas may sound trite and overused, but this novel is truly an eye opener. It helps you to look deep within yourself and understand what you are missing in your life.

Though it is a fact that many important people who changed the world like Lenin, Mahatma Gandhi & Jawaharlal Nehru had studied different disciplines of humanities. We are in the depth of 21st century and the myth is yet to be broken that a child hailing from humanities is incompetent. On the contrary the truth is that an individual should possess creative, critical, analytical, logical bent of mind and above all excellent communication skills to survive in Humanities. Unlike other subjects Humanities polishes the 'General Awareness' of individuals which help them to stand 'out of the crowd' and it also helps them to tackle different kinds of competitive examinations. It is a misconception that a person from the humanities background cannot be inclined to computer skills. But the truth is that a lawyer who renders legal advices online will definitely pick up tech skills such as Blogging, html etc. In Humanities the career prospects are ample and diversified. Here is a glimpse of few of the career avenues in humanities-

- > Bureaucrats i.e. IAS, IPS, IRS, IFS etc through competitive exam of UPSC (Union Public Service Commission), choice of subjects to be taken in Higher Secondary is Humanities with the subject choice of Political Science, Geography, History & Legal Studies.
- > Lawyers i.e. BALLB, choice of subjects to be taken in Higher Secondary, Humanities with Legal Studies. Thereafter there is a requirement of Integrated 5 year course in Law from reputed colleges across India through CLAT.

- > Economist, Studying Humanities with Economics in Higher Secondary, thereafter pursuing a degree in economics, at higher level PHD degree in Economics. Some important economics careers include auditor, stockbroker, business manager, pricing analyst, statistician, financial consultant etc.
- > Intelligence Analyst, requires study of Humanities with the subject of Political Science & Legal Studies in Higher Secondary. An Intelligence Analyst is an employee of the government who pieces together information from a variety of sources in order to assess threats & prevent attacks from interior & exterior enemies. They are also known as Criminal Intelligence Analyst, Civilian Intelligence Analyst, and Intelligence Research Specialist.
- > Oceanography, the study of oceanography is interdisciplinary. It covers a wide range of disciplines, from biology and ecology, to physics and chemistry, to history and geology.
- > Integrated courses in the field of law which requires a wide knowledge of various disciplines such as BTech- LLB, Business-LLB, Psychology-LLB, Space Law, Cyber Crime (Tech Skills & Law Skills), Environmental Law (Geography, Ecology & Law)

In a nutshell, there are traces of humanities in science & commerce too. Therefore, Humanities is definitely an intellectually stimulating subject which makes an individual different and unique.

So the Dalai Lama has rightly said that love and compassion are not luxuries rather are necessities which are required for carving a new improvised world and these competencies are most importantly inculcated through humanities.
