



This activity helped them build their language skills, develop confidence, and enhancing their learning.

Development of 'Fine Motor Skills' is very important in the early years of childhood. It helps in building pincer grip and developing eye-hand eye coordination for pointing, touching, grasping, holding etc. There were few activities planned for the Shreeyans of Pre-Primary classes. Shreeyans of Pre-Nursery did the Knob Cylinder Puzzle Activity wherein they had to use their fingers (pincer grip) to pull out the cylinders with knobs and then fit the cylinders back as per the correct shape and size, whereas the Shreeyans of Nursery did the Lacing Activity with wool to create a border for their art work. The Shreeyans of Kindergarten have done many activities related to fine motor skills, like 'Pea-Pod Shelling', 'Orange Peeling' and 'Peg Activity'. 




Pre-Primary Wing - Form Morning 2023-24








Lohri / Makar Sankranti


India is the perfect mix of different cultures and traditional flavours. Devotion to the cause of national integration has given the country its independent identity.

Envisioning Education: The Transformative Power of Cinema

As a student, certain concepts were engrained into our minds like carvings on stone tablets during the Indus Valley Civilization. One such topic was deforestation and why it was wrong. Literature and cinema can play a massive role in the education process.
